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## Roy's Mission to Vocalize the Subalterns in The Ministers of Utmost Happiness

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## Abstract:

The subalterns are the groups of people who are socially, economically and politically marginalized from main stream. Even after seventy years of independence, Indian mainstream society denied to give a respectable place to the subalterns. Besides the Muslim and the Dalit minorities, Roy focuses on the Kashmiries, the Transgender and the Left in her second fiction, The Ministers of Utmost Happiness. My endeavour in this paper is to bring out the ugly realities imbedded in the fiction in question about the life of the Indian subalterns and the injustices inflicted on them by the state as hegemonic force and the members of the main stream society. The injustices are committed by the oppressive power structures and their voices are either silenced by the mainstream media or kept hidden by the state. ## Introduction:
